Come and give the Rev. J. F. Buxton a welcome on Wednesday evening, December 4th, at 8 p.m. Many of you will be glad to see him again.

Note carefully the list of services during Advent, and make up your minds beforehand which of them you will attend. When that has been done, nothing should prevent your coming, not even bad weather. There is a fine Bible text that teaches us our obligation, "Promise unto the Lord your God and keep it, all ye that are round about Him."

THE VICAR'S NOTES AND NOTICES

This is just to give notice that the Confirmation has been
fixed for Tuesday, March 11th, at 8 p.m. in S. Giles' Church.
Classes will be arranged towards the end of next month, but
this is to give you time to think things over.

There was a good meeting of our Band of Mercy (boys and
girls) last Tuesday evening at 5.30. Mr Fitzgerald spoke to
the children, Miss Pertz gave them cards of membership, and
the names of new members were taken. All children may join
the Band (a great many have already done so), which reminds
them of their obligation, amongst other things, to treat animals
kindly.

On Friday in last week, the Right Rev. Bishop Richardson
was kind enough to address our Mothers' Meeting. There
was a full attendance in Church, and the Bishop gave an
interesting and instructive description of Mission Work and
life in Zanzibar, which was much appreciated.

Monday saw our first meeting of the Clothing Club, which
was held in the Infants' School. The new rules are working
excellently, and many of the poorer children have now joined,
and are encouraged to save up their odd pennies for warm
clothes and boots. Children may join from the age of three
years, and may put in any sum from 2d. weekly. I am going
to see what can be done in the matter of coal too. It will be
something, at any rate, if each hundredweight can be delivered
free, instead of having to pay 1d. or 2d. on it.

I am asked to tell you about our Parish Rummage Sale, which will take place on Thursday, Dec. 12th, at 3 o'clock in Gloucester Street. We have to lay some stress on this social event, as our Parish Room is largely depending upon the sale for its upkeep. If you have any old clothes or household articles you can spare, please do the Mission Room a good turn, and the poor a kindness, by sending a post-card to Mr S. Easy, 47, New Square, and a cart will be sent to your house to clear away anything that you may be disposed to give.

On Wednesday, Dec. 11th, I want to have a short Service of preparation for Christmas Communion. Yes, I know that is rather early, but *nearer* Christmas many are so much engaged with duties that they are prevented from coming, and so practically no preparation is made at all. Some printed papers will be distributed on Wednesday and some instructions will be given.

There is a good deal of bronchitis about just now in the case of very young children. Do not hesitate to send for the Clergy—especially if the children are unbaptised—for they are always glad to come at any time.

It will be readily understood by a glance at our list of daily engagements—and it is by no means a complete list—that it is impossible for us to do much social calling. Practically every evening in the week is engaged in some work connected with the Church. I have only one evening generally free—Thursday; and during the day our meetings, schools, and ordinary daily routine work and services leave very little time for social amenities. It would be a real kindness to me if parishioners and others would take an intimation that it is only considerations of limited time and strength that prevent my calling, and that it is not from lack of interest or goodwill. Any case of illness is attended to immediately.

Next Term the "King's Messengers" (S.P.G.) will, I hope, take a new lease of life.

We shall also begin again our Sunday afternoon classes for young men in the useful Mission Room. For it has been under repair, and has been thoroughly cleaned and will, I trust, be in order for the S. Giles' Juniors' Cricket Club Annual Concert, which will take place on Thursday, Dec. 5th. On Friday and Saturday this week the room will have to be closed for floor scrubbing.

THE VICAR'S NOTES AND NOTICES

An appeal for financial help has been sent to nearly every
house in the parish, as it has been suggested that one definite
appeal for the necessary parochial funds is a better method
than a constant asking for small sums during the year.

Though such objects as the Clergy Fund and the Clothing
Club have for a long time been asked for separately, yet we
have felt it better to include these, even at the risk of some one
being asked twice for the same thing. The reason is that the
appeal reaches many people who would not otherwise have
been asked, either from their being of a different religious
faith, or who from their long connexion with College Chapels
or other Churches would not be approached in the ordinary
course. From the generous response that we have received
even in this first week, I think I may say that we are justified
in including these objects in our list.

Dr Liveing has for many years been good enough to
provide £105 towards the stipend of one assistant curate;
the Freewill offering scheme is designed to provide as far as
may be, for another; and we are all most grateful for this
invaluable help. Miss Alice Clay also collects for the Clothing
Club—a work which is much appreciated. But the additional
help that the appeal has already brought in, shews that most

parishioners feel that the Church ought to be supported in one way or another, and the large choice of objects gives every one an opportunity of choosing some fund for which money is required.

The Treasurer acknowledges with many thanks the following sums, which the Vicar has also acknowledged personally :— (Dec. 8th) Anon £1, Anon £1 ; (Dec. 9th) Prof. Marshall £1, Mr and Mrs Reddaway £5, Mrs Guggenheim £1, Mrs Bles £2 ; (Dec. 10th) Miss Pertz £1. 10s., Septima £1 ; (Dec. 11th) The Mayor of Cambridge (Mr W. H. Francis) £5. 5s., Mrs Mollison 10s.

The Rev. W. L. Arrowsmith will be absent from the parish from Thursday, Dec. 12th, until Monday, Dec. 23rd. He will be busy conducting a mission at Hatfield with Fr Waggett for about ten days.

I was very glad to see so many people come to our service of preparation on Wednesday, and I propose to hold another service of the same description somewhat, on Wednesday, Dec. 18th, at 8 p.m. I had hoped that the Rev. W. A. Collisson, Mus.Doc., would have come to us for that Wednesday, but he has just written—"I do wish I could come, but what can I do? I have to go abroad to Switzerland and Egypt begging for the 'Waifs and Strays' until April."

Friday, Dec. 20th, will be a day of continuous intercession in S. Giles' Church. A paper will be found on the table at the end of the Church, containing the various half-hours into which the day will be divided. Subjects of intercession will be provided. You are asked to put your name or initials against any particular time that suits you best. Last year the paper was very quickly filled up, so I hope that at least an equal number of people will be in Church this year. Should there be more names than there are half-hours, we shall divide some of the periods into quarters.

I have received a cheque from Magdalene College Chapel collections for £2. 9s. 1d. (Poor Fund). Also one for £5 to add to the Church Cleaning offerings, so I do not think we shall be so far off the sum required, after all.

Our carols were apparently so much admired last year that all our manuscript books but four have disappeared. I gave a reckless kind of permission that they might be copied, but I hope if any have strayed, they will come back again soon. It is rather difficult for the choir to sing them with only one book between five or six people!

Do not forget the poor on Christmas Day

Please send any holly, evergreens, and flowers for the Christmas Decorations to the Church not later than 10 o'clock on Tuesday morning. Mrs Dalton has kindly undertaken the general arrangements again. As the interior of the Church is now in such good order, we want the decorations to be particularly good this year.

We shall have, I hope, a Christmas Crib again in church. I think it will be admitted that the figures are of real artistic merit.

Do not forget the poor on Christmas Day

People have asked me "May we make our Christmas Communion at the First Eucharist which begins at midnight?" The answer is "Of course you may. Why not?" Go home quietly from work or business and make a good preparation. And you ought to have plenty of time for this.

The Holy Days which follow Christmas Day are often ill-observed by Church people. You should make a point of coming to the Holy Eucharist on each of the three Festivals. There will be a Sung Eucharist at 10 a.m. on all three days.

The clergy will be glad to attend to sick people who may wish, through infirmity, to receive their Christmas Communion at home.

Christmas Eve is a Fast not a Feast

It may not be out of place to urge all readers of this paper not to encourage in any shape or form carol singing in the streets. It need hardly be necessary to remark that the singers are *not* the S. Giles' choir. Their voices should proclaim that fact. And as for the children that make the streets hideous with their "singing"—to give them anything as a reward is to encourage (1) irreverence—for it is nothing short of this—and (2) begging and touting—which are not desirable accomplishments at any time. If you want carol singing, it is worth while coming to Church to hear it decently and reverently done, by members of your own Church and parish.
